Summary of the Counter-Trafficking in Persons Working Group Meetings

Introduction

The Countering-Trafficking in Persons (C-TIP) Inter-Agency Working Group (WG) on combating trafficking in human beings was established in October 2002 by the Republic of Armenia (ROA) Prime Minister's Decree No 591-A.

The main mandate of the C-TIP WG is to report the progress of combatting human trafficking and exploitation activities to the Anti-Trafficking Council, as per the C-TIP National Action Plan (NAP) in the ROA.

The C-TIP WG also submits recommendations to the Anti-Trafficking Council for its comments and approval and submits semiannual reports to the Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs (MOLSA) on their respective activities within the NAP.

Stakeholders Who Form the C-TIP WG

The stakeholders who form the C-TIP WG are drawn from both state and non-state agencies.

The C-TIP WG brief summarizes meetings from October 2021 to August 2023. D4I attended these meetings and noted the highlights, recommendations, etc. During the two years of the project's implementation, D4I assisted in the facilitation of seven WG forums/meetings. Details are outlined in the table below.





Key Highlights of the C-TIP WG: October 2021 to August 2023

- The C-TIP WG, with the leadership of the Division of Anti-Trafficking and Women's Issues, spearheaded development of the 2023–2025 C-TIP NAP and used evidence from the assessments conducted from October 2021–September 2022 (Year 1 of the D4I project).
- The C-TIP WG conducted regular meetings that provided an opportunity for the stakeholders to review NAP progress and provided the annual report to the C-TIP Inter-Ministerial Council every year, as per the reporting timelines. With D4I's support, the Division of Anti-Trafficking and Women's Issues, together with its stakeholders who are members of the WG, realized progress in using metrics to track the NAP implementation in the last two years of the activity. The WG stakeholders were able to coordinate C-TIP NAP activity implementation, through collaboration and leveraging each other's responsibilities in responding to human trafficking and exploitation. For example, the USAID D4I activity collaborated with the U.S. Embassy's Together Against Trafficking in Persons (TATIP) project to conduct capacity strengthening in monitoring and evaluation (M&E) for social workers to undertake protection and prevention of trafficking in persons (TIP) in their day-to-day execution of duties.

Challenges Faced by the C-TIP WG

- Some stakeholders, especially the civil society organizations, do not have a clear reporting mandate for the interventions they undertake, and some information is never collected.
- Resource allocation for the division to conduct the WG meetings regularly is inadequate, which will prove an issue for sustaining the consistency of the WG meetings.
- There is a high turnover of staff in the Division of Anti-Trafficking and Women's Issues. This affects the division's ability to undertake the actions and recommendations passed during the WG meetings.
- The C-TIP WG does not have a feedback mechanism on program progress from the Council.

D4I Recommendations to the C-TIP WG

To ensure sustainability of the C-TIPWG, D4I recommends the following:

- 1. Continue regular WG meetings on at least a quarterly basis to discuss progress and planned activities amongst stakeholders.
- 2. During the WG meeting, share any C-TIP-related data and agree on the status of the TIP cases reported nationally.
- 3. Monitor the C-TIP NAP performance using the reporting tool and highlight agency-level non-performance and any actions to be taken. These actions should be reviewed in the next meeting.

 Include non-governmental organizations in reporting and data sharing within the WG activities.

Status of the victims' data in 2021: Based on annual data on victims, the participants highlighted that persons with mental health problems should be included in the risk groups when dealing with C-TIP issues. As there are cases of exploitation of these people, there should be specialized prescreening by the social workers and upskilling among the frontline workers to handle these victims. A tool to undertake screening of the victims will be developed with a targeted approach to their needs. The participants agreed to hold the next WG meeting early in 2022 to undertake the C-TIP NAP reporting for the Year 2021 using D4I's approach to measure activity performance.

The draft NAP was presented, and participants provided inputs to enrich the document. The D4I team was tasked to work on the indicators for each chapter, data sources, and the targets. The review of data sources will be based on the data mapping and templates provided. Based on the M&E capacity strengthening action plan, D4I will undertake M&E trainings for the WG members. Emphasis was placed on data collection and reporting and that all stakeholders were to report their data properly and in timely fashion, including referral of cases for the Identification Committee. MOLSA and D4I will conduct a joint visit to the center that provides services to victims, review the data collection, and provide next steps to improve the data

The project team also had the opportunity to assess the M&E-related skill/knowledge needs of the key actors/stakeholders, which will be addressed during the upcoming training.
